THE BEATITUDES OF JESUS; THE NEW WAY.


If the poor, the hungry, the sorrowful, and the hated are all blessed, then why should anyone attempt to help them improve their lot? The answer is that there is a difference between choosing poverty and being plunged

Blessed ARE THE poor in spirit, or Theirs Fingdom Heaven. Matthew 5:3 into it without one's choice. Poverty chosen for the sake of the Kingdom of God is different from poverty caused or inflicted on others due to greed. We must also learn to know the meaning of what it means to be poor in the Spirit as instructed by Jesus.

On this Sunday, we are invited to respond to the challenges of the Beatitudes in our daily lives. Millions are starving, persecuted, homeless, and hopeless and the only way the promises of the Beatitudes can become a reality for them is through the efforts of people like you and me. That is why we are told that we will be judged on the basis of our acts of mercy and charity (Mt 25:31-46). St. Teresa of Calcutta, and her

Missionaries of Charity have accepted this challenge and demonstrate that we can *"live the Beatitudes"* in the modern world. Hence, let us remember that each time we reach out to help the needy, the sick, and the oppressed, we share with them a foretaste of the promises of the Beatitudes here and now. Just as the apostles were called to minister to society's 'untouchables', all Christians are called to minister to the 'untouchables', the discriminated against, and the marginalized in our own modern society.

ARCHDIOCESAN JUBILEE CELEBRATION DAY AT THE FRIARS AYLESFORD 7TH JUNE 2025


Led by Archbishop John Wilson, we will gather as an Archdiocese at The Friars, Aylesford for a day of prayer, reflection, celebration, and fun. There will be lots of activities, for children as well as for adults. This will be the centre-piece event of the 2025 Jubilee in the Archdiocese of Southwark. There will also be a walking pilgrimage from St George's Cathedral in Southwark to The Friars (2-6 June 2025). **The event itself is free**. CATECHISM ON THE HOLY BIBLE Why has the Catholic Bible seven more books than the Protestant Bible?

The term *Catholic Bible* can be understood in two ways. More generally, it can refer to a <u>Christian</u> <u>Bible</u> that includes the whole 73-book <u>canon</u> recognized by the <u>Catholic Church</u>, including some of the deuterocanonical books (and parts of books) of the Old Testament which are in the

Greek <u>Septuagint</u> collection, but which are not present in the <u>Hebrew Masoretic Text</u> collection. The current official version of the Catholic Bible is the *Nova Vulgata* which is also called the

New Latin Vulgate



The Bible at the time of Jesus was called the <u>Hebrew Bible</u>. It consisted of only Old Testament books. The original was in Hebrew language. When the majority of the Jews living outside Palestine started speaking Greek, a group of seventy experts were sent to Alexandria to translate the Hebrew Bible into Greek, as requested by the emperor. The Greek translation of the Hebrew Bible was called the <u>Septuagint Bible</u>. But it contained 46 books. The seven additional books were 1) Judith, 2) Baruch, 3) Sirach (Ecclesiastes), 4) Wisdom, 5) Tobit, and 6) Maccabees I & 7) Maccabees II. Besides, there were some <u>additions to Esther (Vulgate Esther</u> 10:4-16:24) and additions to Daniel: (Prayer of Azariah and Song of the Three Holy Children, Bel and the Dragon). Since Jesus and the apostles used the Septuagint Bible, the Pharisees who finalized the official list (canon) of the Hebrew Bible books in AD 90,

called the additional books in the Septuagint Bible "<u>apocrypha</u>" meaning not-inspired or <u>Deuterocanonical books</u>. But the recent discovery of fragments of three Deuterocanonical books among the <u>Dead Sea scrolls</u> found at <u>Qumran</u> proves that they were part of the ancient Hebrew Bible. Since the early Church spread mostly among Greek speaking Jews and gentiles, it accepted Septuagint as its Bible. That is why out of the approximately 340 New Testament references to the Old Testament 300 are from the Septuagint. At the Council of Rome in 382 AD, the Church finalized a canon of 46 Old Testament books (including the Deuterocanonical books) and 27 in the New Testament. This decision was ratified and confirmed by the councils at Hippo (393), Carthage (397, 419), II Nicea (787), Florence (1442), and Trent (1546). All Christians believed the 46 books of the Old Testament as inspired books until Martin Luther in the 16th century <u>discarded the Deuterocanonical books</u> as uninspired because they were not found in the Hebrew Bible finalized in the first century AD by the anti Christian Jews. But they were retained at the end of the protestant bibles (King James Version) until the Edinburgh Committee of the British Foreign Bible Society excised them in 1825. The Catholic Church considers them inspired and integral part of the Bible. (Fr. Anthony)

READINGS FOR SUNDAY 16TH **FEBRUARY 2025**

First reading

Jeremiah 17:5-8

'Cursed is the man who trusts in man; blessed *is the man who trusts in the Lord.*' Thus says the Lord: 'Cursed is the man who

trusts in man and makes flesh his strength, whose heart turns away from the Lord. He is like a shrub in the desert, and shall not see any good come. He shall dwell in the parched places of the wilderness, in an uninhabited salt land.

'Blessed is the man who trusts in the Lord, whose trust is the Lord. He is like a tree planted by water, that sends out its roots by the stream, and does not fear when heat comes, for its leaves remain green, and is not anxious in the year of drought, for it does not cease to bear fruit.'

Responsorial Psalm

Ps 1:1-2. 3. 4, 6. R Psalm 40(39):5a Blessed the man who has placed his trust in the Lord.

1.Blessed indeed is the man who follows not the counsel of the wicked, nor stands in the path with sinners, nor abides in the company of scorners, but whose delight is the law of the Lord, and who ponders his law day and night. 2.He is like a tree that is planted beside the flowing waters, that yields its fruit in due season, and whose leaves shall never fade; and all that he does shall prosper. 3.Not so are the wicked, not so! For they, like winnowed chaff, shall be driven away by the wind. For the Lord knows the way of the righteous, but the way of the wicked will perish.

Second reading 1 Corinthians 15:12, 16-20

'If Christ has not been raised, your faith is futile.

Brothers and Sisters: If Christ is proclaimed as raised from the dead, how can some of you say that there is no resurrection of the dead? For if the dead are not raised, not even Christ has been raised. And if Christ has not been raised, your faith is futile and you are still in your sins. Then those also who have fallen asleep in Christ have perished. If in Christ we have hope in this life only, we are of all people most to be pitied. But in fact Christ has been raised from the dead, the first fruits of those who have fallen asleep.

Gospel Acclamation Luke 6:23ab Alleluia, alleluia. Rejoice and leap for joy, says the Lord, for behold, your reward is great in heaven. Alleluia.

Luke 6:17, 20-26 'Blessed are you who are poor. Woe to you who are rich.

At that time: Jesus came down with the Twelve and stood on a level place, with a great crowd of his disciples and a great multitude of people from all Judea and Jerusalem and the sea coast of Tyre and Sidon. And he lifted up his eyes on his disciples, and said: 'Blessed are you who are poor, for yours is the kingdom of God. Blessed are you who are hungry now, for you shall be satisfied. Blessed are you who weep now, for you shall laugh. Blessed are you when people hate you, and when they exclude you, and revile you, and spurn your name as evil on account of the Son of Man! Rejoice in that day, and leap for joy, for behold, your reward is great in heaven; for so their fathers did to the prophets. But woe to you who are rich, for you have received your consolation. Woe to you who are full now, for you shall be hungry. Woe to you who laugh now, for you shall mourn and weep. Woe to you, when all people speak well of you, for so their fathers did to the false prophets.'
